

Talking Points for ASHA's Study on State Investment in STD Prevention

These talking points are offered as a companion to the state profiles and the full report.

The burden of STDs and the challenge of prevention

- There are 36 new STD infections in the U.S. every minute. Half of these are among people 15-24 years of age.¹
- The cost to treat STDs in the U.S. has been estimated at \$14.7 billion annually.²

Despite the costs of untreated STDs, states and the federal government invest a small amount in STD prevention

- While STD treatment costs in the U.S. are \$49 per capita, the federal government invests only \$0.60 per capita in STD prevention.³
- States invest an average of \$0.23 per capita.⁴

States can do more to reduce the costs (human and financial) of STDs

- Invest in proven STD prevention programs and strategies
- Assure the existence of laws and mandates that enhance STD prevention efforts
